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Changing fractions to decimals free worksheets

Six percent are written as 0.06 decimal format. The percentage comes from the Latin term *procentum*, which means a hundred. This means one-hundredths, or $1/100$. So six percent is six hundred parts, or $6/100$. The percentage is used to express figures in science and commerce by proportion per 100. The use of percentages originated in ancient Rome, when fractions of 100 proportions were used. August Caesar auctioned goods that year in taxes of $1/100$. In the Middle Ages, the denominations of money grew, and calculations, the denominator of which is one hundred, became more common. A decimal system is a way to express large and small numbers by using a decimal point. Similarly, using a decimal system is less complicated than writing, adding, subtracting or multiplying mixed numbers with fractions. For example, it is easier to write ten and a half as 10.5 than 10 $1/2$. Adding decimal numbers, such as 10.5 and 29.75, is much easier than adding 10 $1/2$ and 29 $3/4$, where you need to replace fractions with common denominators before adding fractions. It is also easier to compare decimal numbers than fractions. The decimal system, which uses base 10, is a system used for calculations in scientific and engineering disciplines that may require more accuracy. In addition, people in everyday life need decimals to perform basic tasks. Issaurink/Getty Images Students should be able to convert fractions into decimals, decimals to fractions, percentages to decimals, decimals to percentages, and so on. While the calculator makes these calculations easy, first of all, students should understand the math for calculator functions. These worksheets require students to perform the calculation manually and check with calculator. (Just divide the top number from the bottom number for the calculator.) But it's just a calculation, not a number. Use images (pizza works perfectly) to help students understand the true math behind the concept.
